Living at the bottom of Miromiro Road, it meant a nice loop up to the top of the hill and back down. I moved into my little two bedroom cottage about 7 years ago, and thought the house would be all I needed. As a single woman, I'd have a bedroom to sleep in and a spare 'art' room. However life throws strange things at you sometimes, and 2 years later I had met my partner - a man who came with a pre-made family of 4 boys. A year later he moved in. At one point, we had my mum sharing bunk beds with child 3, whilst child 4 slept in our walk in wardrobe. Children 1 and 2 slept in a sofa bed in the lounge. Most of the time though, it was just my partner and me, our cat and three chooks, so the house worked perfectly. We never did manage to tame our jungle of a garden, but always felt secure in our little treetop sanctuary. Everyone that braved the walk up our stairs, puffed when they got to the top, then gasped at our view. She is in a pretty special little spot. We loved Normandale and it was purely the growing boys and a need for more space that caused us to move. Now that they are all teens, the littlest one no longer fits in the walk-in! So now we find ourselves in sunny Wairarapa. Featherston allowed us the space we all needed and enough land to increase our menagerie, the kids are already in love with the dog and excited for spring to get a few more chickens. Remembering Bill McCauley

Mr. Bill Macaulay, a member of a well known Normandale family who lived at 132 Miromiro Road, has passed away in his 90th year at Te Omanga Hospice.

Bill grew up in Normandale from 1930, and was one of the last pupils of the first Normandale School. The old school building is now used as the Normandale playcentre.

The last operating year of the school was 1937, when Bill was just 6 years old.

His father, Hector G Macaulay, was the school secretary at the time.

From there Bill attended Hutt Central School.

On leaving school, Bill worked for Dishmaster in Petone, later Cory Wright & Salmon, and then to went on to establish in 1959 Macaulay Metals, Machinery and Scrap. He was a self made, shrewd, and tough business man.

He had a long association with the Petone Rugby Football Club, and was a former President, and a Life Member. He was also a member of the Wellington Racing Club, a horse owner, and member of the Hutt Bowling Club.

Bill was 8 years older than myself when I was paper boy in the 1950's. I can remember his father, Hec, building a new house over the top of the old one. This project went on for many years until completion.

Many of Bill's family still reside in the region.
