






UPCOMING EVENTS

Miromiro seen in upper Normandale

The miromiro (the North Island Tomtit) is becoming a regular visitor to gardens in Normandale. Flitting between trees and shrubs, gleaning insects from the leaves and from cobwebs, the miromiro is not too shy, but very fast moving. While a real joy to see, it can be difficult to get a good photo (see pictured).

Low flying kererū

Low flying kererū have been spotted swooping across roads in Normandale. This has caused concern for some residents when driving. There is the potential for the Normandale Residents' Association to make the case to council for 'slow for kereru' road signs to be erected. However this requires verification of low flying areas. KERERU

About kererū

The kererū, or the kūkupa in some northern Māori dialects, is a native pigeon to New Zealand. While not endangered, they are compromised by introduced species like possums and rats. They are also affected by flying into moving vehicles, overhead power lines and windows. They have a wide distribution throughout the country including native forest and urban shrubbed areas. They often roost on power lines and tops of trees and usually nest one egg at a time.

The kererū is a big bird, measuring up to 50cm and weighing up to 650g. They also sound out a distinct low frequency 'whop' when flying. Since the extinction of the moa, the kererū is now one of the only bird species big enough to swallow large fruit, such as those of karaka, miro, tawa and taraire, and disperse the seed over long distances.
